The town board is hosting a "town hall forum" on Wednesday, at 6 p.m.

This will be an open community forum for questions, ideas, concerns, etc.

I hope we will spend at least some time talking about

A) What do you see as the biggest problems in Wilmington?

&

B) What projects (dredging the river, expanding bike lanes, skating pavilion, etc.) should the town board focus on?

I hope to hear your ideas, and your concerns.

There is a town board meeting tonight, and the agenda is characteristically ambitious. If we aren't near the end of it by 7:45 or so, we will probably table the remaining discussion items. The agenda is at the end of this email.

The "public hearing" on the zoning code amendments we've been discussing for the past several years will close this evening. You can still submit written comments via

the town website, and you can say anything you would like to say (about the zoning amendments) at the start of the meeting tonight.
